A BILL

То	amend sections 3301.07 and 4508.02 and to enact							
	section 5.2223 of the Revised Code to require							
	certain driver education courses to include thirty							
	minutes of instruction relating to anatomical gifts							
	and anatomical gift procedures and to designate							
	March as "Eye Donor Month in Ohio."							

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1.	That	sections	3301.07	and 4508	3.02 be	amer	ided and	
section 5.2223	of the	e Revised	Code be	enacted	to read	d as	follows:	

Sec. 5.2223. The month of March is designated as "Eye Donor Month in Ohio."

Sec. 3301.07. The state board of education shall exercise 11 under the acts of the general assembly general supervision of the 12 system of public education in the state. In addition to the powers 13 otherwise imposed on the state board under the provisions of law, 14 the board shall have the following powers:

(A) Exercise policy forming, planning, and evaluativefunctions for the public schools of the state, and for adulteducation, except as otherwise provided by law;

(B) Exercise leadership in the improvement of public 19 education in this state, and administer the educational policies 20 of this state relating to public schools, and relating to 21 instruction and instructional material, building and equipment, 22 transportation of pupils, administrative responsibilities of 23 school officials and personnel, and finance and organization of 24 school districts, educational service centers, and territory. 25 Consultative and advisory services in such matters shall be 26 provided by the board to school districts and educational service 27 centers of this state. The board also shall develop a standard of 28 financial reporting which shall be used by all school districts 29 and educational service centers to make their financial 30 information available to the public in a format understandable by 31 the average citizen and provide year-to-year comparisons for at 32 least five years. The format shall show, among other things, 33 district and educational service center revenue by source; 34 expenditures for salaries, wages, and benefits of employees, 35 showing such amounts separately for classroom teachers, other 36 employees required to hold licenses issued pursuant to sections 37 3319.22 to 3319.31 of the Revised Code, and all other employees; 38 expenditures other than for personnel, by category, including 39 utilities, textbooks and other educational materials, equipment, 40 permanent improvements, pupil transportation, extracurricular 41 athletics, and other extracurricular activities; and per pupil 42 expenditures. 43

(C) Administer and supervise the allocation and distribution
 of all state and federal funds for public school education under
 the provisions of law, and may prescribe such systems of
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47 accounting as are necessary and proper to this function. It may require county auditors and treasurers, boards of education, 49 educational service center governing boards, treasurers of such 50 boards, teachers, and other school officers and employees, or 51 other public officers or employees, to file with it such reports 52 as it may prescribe relating to such funds, or to the management 53 and condition of such funds.

(D) Formulate and prescribe minimum standards to be applied 54 to all elementary and secondary schools in this state for the 55 purpose of requiring a general education of high quality. Such 56 standards shall provide adequately for: the licensing of teachers, 57 administrators, and other professional personnel and their 58 assignment according to training and qualifications; efficient and 59 effective instructional materials and equipment, including library 60 facilities; the proper organization, administration, and 61 supervision of each school, including regulations for preparing 62 all necessary records and reports and the preparation of a 63 statement of policies and objectives for each school; buildings, 64 grounds, health and sanitary facilities and services; admission of 65 pupils, and such requirements for their promotion from grade to 66 grade as will assure that they are capable and prepared for the 67 level of study to which they are certified; requirements for 68 graduation; and such other factors as the board finds necessary. 69

In the formulation and administration of such standards for 70 nonpublic schools the board shall also consider the particular 71 needs, methods and objectives of those schools, provided they do 72 not conflict with the provision of a general education of a high 73 quality and provided that regular procedures shall be followed for 74 promotion from grade to grade of pupils who have met the 75 educational requirements prescribed. 76

(E) Formulate and prescribe minimum standards for driver education courses conducted at high schools in the state or by

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79 educational service centers or joint vocational school district 80 boards of education. In the formulation of standards for driver 81 education courses, the board shall call upon the director of 82 public safety for advice and assistance. The standards shall 83 require twenty-four hours of classroom instruction, and eight 84 hours of actual behind-the-wheel instruction conducted on public 85 streets and highways of this state, but shall not require any 86 additional hours of observation within a vehicle. The board shall 87 require energy conservation information as part of the driver 88 education curriculum. Such information shall include, but need not 89 be limited to, the identification of inefficient driving 90 techniques and improper maintenance as they relate to decreased 91 gas mileage, information regarding the costs and benefits of 92 different modes of travel, and information concerning relative 93 fuel economy and life-cycle costs of new automobile purchases. The 94 board also shall require financial responsibility information as 95 part of the driver education curriculum. In addition, the board 96 shall require that of the twenty-four hours of classroom 97 instruction prescribed by this division, thirty minutes of that 98 time be devoted to anatomical gifts and anatomical gift 99 procedures. The board also may require as part of the health and 100 driver education curricula curriculum information developed under 101 section 2108.15 of the Revised Code promoting the donation of 102 anatomical gifts pursuant to Chapter 2108. of the Revised Code and 103 may provide the information to high schools, educational service 104 centers, and joint vocational school district boards of education.

(F) Prepare and submit annually to the governor and the
general assembly a report on the status, needs, and major problems
of the public schools of the state, with recommendations for
necessary legislative action and a ten-year projection of the
state's public and nonpublic school enrollment, by year and by
grade level;

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(G) Prepare and submit to the director of budget and 111 management the biennial budgetary requests of the state board of 112 education, for its agencies and for the public schools of the 113 state; 114

(H) Cooperate with federal, state, and local agencies
concerned with the health and welfare of children and youth of the
state;

(I) Require such reports from school districts and 118 educational service centers, school officers, and employees as are 119 necessary and desirable. The superintendents and treasurers of 120 school districts and educational service centers shall certify as 121 to the accuracy of all reports required by law or state board or 122 state department of education rules to be submitted by the 123 district or educational service center and which contain 124 information necessary for calculation of state funding. Any 125 superintendent who knowingly falsifies such report shall be 126 subject to license revocation pursuant to section 3319.31 of the 127 Revised Code. 128

(J) In accordance with Chapter 119. of the Revised Code, 129
adopt procedures, standards, and guidelines for the education of 130
handicapped children pursuant to Chapter 3323. of the Revised 131
Code, including procedures, standards, and guidelines governing 132
programs and services operated by county boards of mental 133
retardation and developmental disabilities pursuant to section 134
3323.09 of the Revised Code; 135

(K) For the purpose of encouraging the development of special 136 programs of education for academically gifted children, employ 137 competent persons to analyze and publish data, promote research, 138 advise and counsel with boards of education, and encourage the 139 training of teachers in the special instruction of gifted 140 children. The board may provide financial assistance out of any 141 funds appropriated for this purpose to boards of education and 142

educational service center governing boards for developing and 143 conducting programs of education for academically gifted children. 144

(L) Require that all public schools emphasize and encourage, 145
within existing units of study, the teaching of energy and 146
resource conservation as recommended to each district board of 147
education by leading business persons involved in energy 148
production and conservation, beginning in the primary grades; 149

(M) Formulate and prescribe minimum standards requiring the
use of phonics as a technique in the teaching of reading in grades
kindergarten through three. In addition, the state board shall
provide in-service training programs for teachers on the use of
phonics as a technique in the teaching of reading in grades
kindergarten through three.

(N) Develop and modify as necessary a state plan for
technology to encourage and promote the use of technological
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advancements in educational settings.

The board may adopt rules necessary for carrying out any 159 function imposed on it by law, and may provide rules as are 160 necessary for its government and the government of its employees, 161 and may delegate to the superintendent of public instruction the 162 management and administration of any function imposed on it by 163 law. It may provide for the appointment of board members to serve 164 on temporary committees established by the board for such purposes 165 as are necessary. Permanent or standing committees shall not be 166 created. 167

Sec. 4508.02. (A) The director of public safety, subject to 168 Chapter 119. of the Revised Code, shall adopt and prescribe such 169 rules concerning the administration and enforcement of this 170 chapter as are necessary to protect the public. The director shall 171 inspect the school facilities and equipment of applicants and 172 licensees and examine applicants for instructor's licenses. 173

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(B) The director shall administer and enforce this chapter, 174
and may call upon the state superintendent of public instruction 175
for assistance in developing and formulating the rules for 176
training beginning drivers. 177

(C) The rules shall require twenty-four hours of classroom
instruction of which thirty minutes shall be devoted to anatomical
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gifts and anatomical gift procedures, and eight hours of actual
behind-the-wheel instruction conducted on public streets and
highways of this state for all beginning drivers of noncommercial
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motor vehicles who are under age eighteen.

(D) The rules shall state the minimum hours for classroom and
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 behind-the-wheel instruction required for beginning drivers of
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 commercial trucks, commercial cars, buses, and commercial
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 tractors, trailers, and semi-trailers.
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Section 2. That existing sections 3301.07 and 4508.02 of the188Revised Code are hereby repealed.189

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
