Sec. 3313.671. (A)(1) Except as otherwise provided in this	6
division (B) of this section, no pupil, at the time of initial	7
entry or at the heginning of each gahool year to an elementary or	Ω

Section 1. That sections 3313.671 and 3701.13 of the Revised

entry or at the beginning of each school year, to an elementary or high school for which the state board of education prescribes 9 minimum standards pursuant to division (D) of section 3301.07 of 10 the Revised Code, shall be permitted to remain in school for more 11 than fourteen days unless the pupil presents written evidence 12 satisfactory to the person in charge of admission, that the pupil 13 has been immunized by a method of immunization approved by the 14 department of health pursuant to section 3701.13 of the Revised 15 Code against mumps, poliomyelitis, diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, 16 rubeola, and rubella or is in the process of being so immunized. 17

health. Any student previously admitted under the "in process of	42
being so immunized" provision and who has not complied with the	43

(2) A pupil who has had natural mumps, and presents a signed	53
statement from the pupil's parent, guardian, or physician to that	54
effect, is not required to be immunized against mumps.	55
(3) A pupil who has had natural chicken pox, and presents a	56
signed statement from the pupil's parent, guardian, or physician	57
to that effect, is not required to be immunized against chicken	58

$\underline{(4)}$ A pupil who presents a written statement of the pupil's	60
parent or guardian in which the parent or guardian objects	61
declines to the immunization for good cause have the pupil	62

$\frac{(4)(5)}{(5)}$ A child whose physician certifies in writing that such	65
immunization against any disease is medically contraindicated is	66
not required to be immunized against that disease. This section	67
does not limit or impair the right of a board of education of a	68

enforce rules to secure immunization against mumps, poliomyelitis,	70

(D) Boards of health, legislative authorities of municipal	81
corporations, and boards of township trustees on application of	82
the board of education of the district or proper authority of any	83
school affected by this section, shall provide at the public	84
expense, without delay, the means of immunization against mumps,	85
poliomyelitis, rubeola, rubella, diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus,	86
and hepatitis B <u>, and chicken pox</u> to pupils who are not so provided	87
by their parents or guardians.	88

Sec. 3701.13. The department of health shall have supervision 89 of all matters relating to the preservation of the life and health 90 of the people and have ultimate authority in matters of quarantine 91 and isolation, which it may declare and enforce, when neither 92 exists, and modify, relax, or abolish, when either has been 93 established. It The department may approve means methods of 94 immunization against mumps, poliomyelitis, rubeola, diphtheria, 95 rubella (German measles), pertussis, tetanus, and hepatitis B the 96 diseases specified in section 3313.671 of the Revised Code for the 97 purpose of carrying out the provisions of section 3313.671 of the 98 Revised Code that section and take such actions as are necessary 99 to encourage vaccination against those diseases. The department may make special or standing orders or rules 102 for preventing the use of fluoroscopes for nonmedical purposes 103 which emit doses of radiation likely to be harmful to any person, 104 for preventing the spread of contagious or infectious diseases, 105 for governing the receipt and conveyance of remains of deceased 106 persons, and for such other sanitary matters as are best 107 controlled by a general rule. Whenever possible, the department 108 shall work in cooperation with the health commissioner of a 109 general or city health district. It may make and enforce orders in 110 local matters when an emergency exists, or when the board of 111
