Section 1. That section 5.2287 of the Revised Code be enacted	4

Sec. 5.2287. The month of September is designated as	б			
"Craniofacial Acceptance Month" to increase public awareness of				
craniofacial conditions and advances in medical treatment of these				
conditions.				
Section 2. In enacting section 5.2287 of the Revised Code,	10

the General Assembly hereby finds the following:	11			
(1) Approximately one hundred thousand children are born each				
year in the United States with a craniofacial condition affecting				
the child's head, neck, extremities, or organs.				
(2) Treatment of a craniofacial condition often lasts from	15			

infancy to adulthood and it is not uncommon for a child to undergo					
multiple surgeries before reaching adulthood.					
(3) Most craniofacial conditions affect individuals and their	18				
families physically, mentally, and socially.					
(4) Many medical procedures have been developed in the past					
thirty years to help improve the quality of life for individuals					
affected by craniofacial conditions.
