The Senate met pursuant to adjournment.

Pursuant to Senate Rule No. 3, the Clerk called the Senate to order.

Senator Burke was selected to preside according to the rule.

The journal of the last legislative day was read and approved.

INTRODUCTION AND FIRST CONSIDERATION OF BILLS

The following bills were introduced and considered the first time:

S. B. No. 211-Senator Bacon.

Cosponsor: Senator Seitz.

To amend sections 1901.261, 1901.31, 1907.20, 1907.26, 1907.261, and 4503.39 and to enact sections 117.102, 1901.263, 1901.44, 1905.202, 1905.33, 1907.25, 1907.263, 2303.203, and 5747.124 of the Revised Code to require that all moneys collected by the clerk of a municipal or county court be paid to the appropriate person, fund, or entity on or before the twentieth day of each month, to permit a municipal or county court to collect unpaid court costs, fees, or fines from an obligor's state income tax refund, to require the Auditor of State to create and maintain a chart detailing the distribution of court costs, fees, and fines collected by municipal and county court clerks, to create the Committee on Court Costs, and to ensure that neither the Registrar nor any deputy registrar accepts any application for the issuance or renewal of a driver's license, commercial driver's license, or temporary instruction permit, or for the registration or transfer of registration of a motor vehicle of a person who fails to pay court costs imposed for offenses by a municipal mayor's, or county court.

S. B. No. 212-Senator Skindell.

Cosponsors: Senators Grendell, Tavares, Brown.

To amend section 1509.74 and to enact sections 1509.031, 1509.191, 1509.192, 1509.227, and 6111.70 of the Revised Code to establish requirements governing well stimulation, brine disposal, and water that is used in the drilling and operation of oil and gas wells on state land, including a requirement that oil and gas permittees pay a five per cent overriding royalty for each well that is stimulated.

S. B. No. 213-Senator Skindell.

Cosponsors: Senators Tavares, Brown.

Establishes a moratorium on horizontal stimulation of oil and gas wells until the United States Environmental Protection Agency publishes a report containing the results of a study of the relationship of hydraulic fracturing to drinking water resources and the Chief of the Division of Oil and Gas Resources Management issues a report analyzing how Ohio's rules address issues raised in the USEPA report.

S. B. No. 214-Senator Burke.
Cosponsor: Senator Patton.

To amend sections 145.57, 148.10, 742.461, 2907.15, 2921.41, 3305.09, 3307.37, 3309.67, and 5505.26 of the Revised Code to modify when a public retirement system, alternative retirement plan, or deferred compensation program must comply with a withholding order for restitution issued on conviction of a public employee for certain offenses committed in the course of public employment.

S. B. No. 215-Senator Burke.
Cosponsor: Senator Jordan.

To enact sections 9.51 to 9.53 of the Revised Code to require public improvement or service contracts between a state agency and a contractor to contain a provision requiring the contractor to use an electronic employment verification system.

OFFERING OF RESOLUTIONS

Senator Burke offered the following concurrent resolution:

S. C. R. No. 16-Senator Burke.
Cosponsors: Senators Beagle, Brown, Patton, Schaffer, Wagoner.

To urge Congress to support the provision of efficient and comprehensive mental health treatment to combat military personnel and combat veterans who are suffering from Posttraumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and other combat-related stress disorders.
