BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE	
OF OHIO (THE SENATE CONCURRING):	
WHEREAS, Caregiving is an essential element of family life	4
and a vital service for children, the ill, the disabled, and the	5
elderly; and	6
WHEREAS, The average Ohioan will be a caregiver for 4.2	7
years; and	8
WHEREAS, Approximately two-thirds of all caregivers in Ohio	9
are women; and	10
WHEREAS, Caregivers who take time off from paid work to care	11
for family members are unable to pay into the Social Security	12
Trust Funds and are unfairly penalized in retirement; and	13
WHEREAS, The establishment of a caregiver credit would	14
bolster economic prospects of unpaid caregivers and provide them	15
with vital retirement security; and	16
WHEREAS, The President and Congress now have the opportunity	17
to support unpaid caregivers by amending the Social Security Act	18
to credit individuals serving as caregivers of dependent relatives	19

for up to five years of such service; now therefore be it
